3. Minutes of the one hundred and eighteenth Annual Meeting, Friday 30 April 2021

The one hundred and eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Society was held on Friday 30 April 2021 at 2 p.m. In view of the Covid-19 pandemic, the meeting took place online, via Zoom.

Those present were Professor Henry Mayr-Harting (President), Dr Nicolas Bell (General Secretary), Professor Katy Cubitt, Dr Daniel DiCenso, Professor David Ganz (Vice-President), Dr Eleanor Giraud, Dr Helen Gittos, Professor Sarah Hamilton, the Rev'd Dr Hugh Kennedy, the Rev'd Dr Michael Lang, Professor Rosalind Love (Publications Secretary), Dr Bernard Moreton (Treasurer), Dr David Pelteret, Professor Susan Rankin (Chairman of the Council), the Rev'd Dr Bruce Ritchie, Fr Gregory Schnackenberg OP, Professor Bryan Spinks, Deacon James Scheer, Dr Elizabeth Teviotdale and Professor Teresa Webber.

- 1. Professor Mayr-Harting was re-elected as President for the year 2021-22.
- 2. Apologies were received from Professor Jesse Billett, Mr Michael McFarland Campbell, Mr Patrick Clinton, Professor Helmut Gneuss (Vice-President), the Rev'd Dr Zachary Guiliano, Dr Anthony Harris, Mr Graham Knowles QC, Dr Tillmann Lohse, Professor Michael Lapidge (Vice-President), Professor Nigel Morgan, Dr Henry Parkes, Dom Alcuin Reid, Dr Alan Thacker, the Rev'd Canon Dr John Toy, Fr Anthony Ward SM and the Rev'd Michael G. Witczak SLD.
- 3. Commemoration was made of Mr Richard Emms, member of the Society, who had died on 5 June 2020.
- 4. The President recorded his thanks for the work undertaken by the officers over the past year, and paid particular tribute to Dr Moreton in a year of many challenges. He commended the work of the several editors of forthcoming volumes.
- 5. The minutes of the one hundred and seventeenth meeting were received as an accurate record and signed by the Chairman of Council.
- 6. The Chairman of the Council agreed to oversee the remainder of the meeting and conveyed her thanks to the President and the Officers for their tireless work for the Society.
- 7. The General Secretary and Treasurer presented their reports, and the Treasurer circulated Book Reports for 2020.
- 8. The Treasurer presented the Accounts, which had been examined by the Independent Examiner. The meeting accepted and formally approved the accounts. The Treasurer was thanked for his work in preparing them. It was agreed that the Secretary would write to Mr Patrick Clinton to thank him for his work in examining the accounts, and would file the accounts with the Charity Commission.
- 9. The meeting voted unanimously that the Officers of the Council for the year 2021–22 should be as follows:

- 10. The meeting considered the membership of the Council. The terms of appointment of Professors Cubitt, Hamilton and Webber and Dr Pelteret expired at this meeting. All had expressed a willingness to serve for a further period of three years, and no other nominations had been received by the Secretary. These four were accordingly elected to serve for a further period of three years until the Annual Meeting of 2024.
- 11. The meeting considered the appointment of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for 2021. The Treasurer reported that Mr Patrick Clinton had offered to serve in this capacity once again, and the meeting agreed unanimously to accept his kind offer.
- 12. It was agreed that the one hundred and nineteenth Annual Meeting would be held in Cambridge on Friday 29 April 2022 at 2 p.m.

4. Secretary's Report for 2021

Progress over the past year has been hindered by the continued effects of the Covid pandemic, and its repercussions for the day-to-day work of the major officers. Editors of forthcoming volumes have nevertheless made good progress on their planned editions, with the gradual reopening of libraries allowing them to catch up with work made impossible in the previous year.

Meanwhile a financial review of the Society's resources concluded with the decision to place a portion of our reserves in investments, which has (so far) had a marked benefit when compared with historically low interest rates. Whether this will continue as interest rates begin to rise remains to be seen.

In the course of the past year the Society welcomed seven new members: Mr Carl Bunderson (Littelton, Colorado, USA), Mr Michael McFarland Campbell (Cúil an tSúdaire, Ireland), Dr Andrew Dunning (Oxford), Mr James Miller (Hertford), Mr Rodrigo Rodrigo Flavio de Oliveira Miranda (St John's, Canada), Mr Simon Scruton (Cradley Heath, Birmingham) and Professor Kate Steiner (Waterloo, Ontario, Canada). We are sorry to record the death of our member Richard Kay.

5 Treasurer's Report for 2021

The Independently Examined Accounts are set out below in the usual format. A statement of income and expenditure by volume will be available as usual at the Annual Meeting, together with the accounts to date for 2022.

After many years of declining interest rates, a decision was made in 2021 to transfer £125,000 from bank deposit accounts to an investment account with CCLA. This was effected half-way through the year, and the benefits can be seen in the accounts already, with a £14k increase in the investment valuation over the half-year period. We cannot perhaps expect that rate of valuation increase to continue (we invested at a time when the market was beginning to recover; and the value of investments may go down as well as up), but over the long term we hope that the change will take better care of the Society's capital.

The changes in investment valuation are reflected in proportionate increases to the Burr Fund, in addition to the previous practice of allocating a proportion of bank interest payments.

The finances of the Society remain healthy, and well-prepared to fund the volumes in preparation.

My queries and clarifications were resolved by the Treasurer and all evidence provided enabled satisfactory completion of my review and there were no unusual items or disclosures identified.

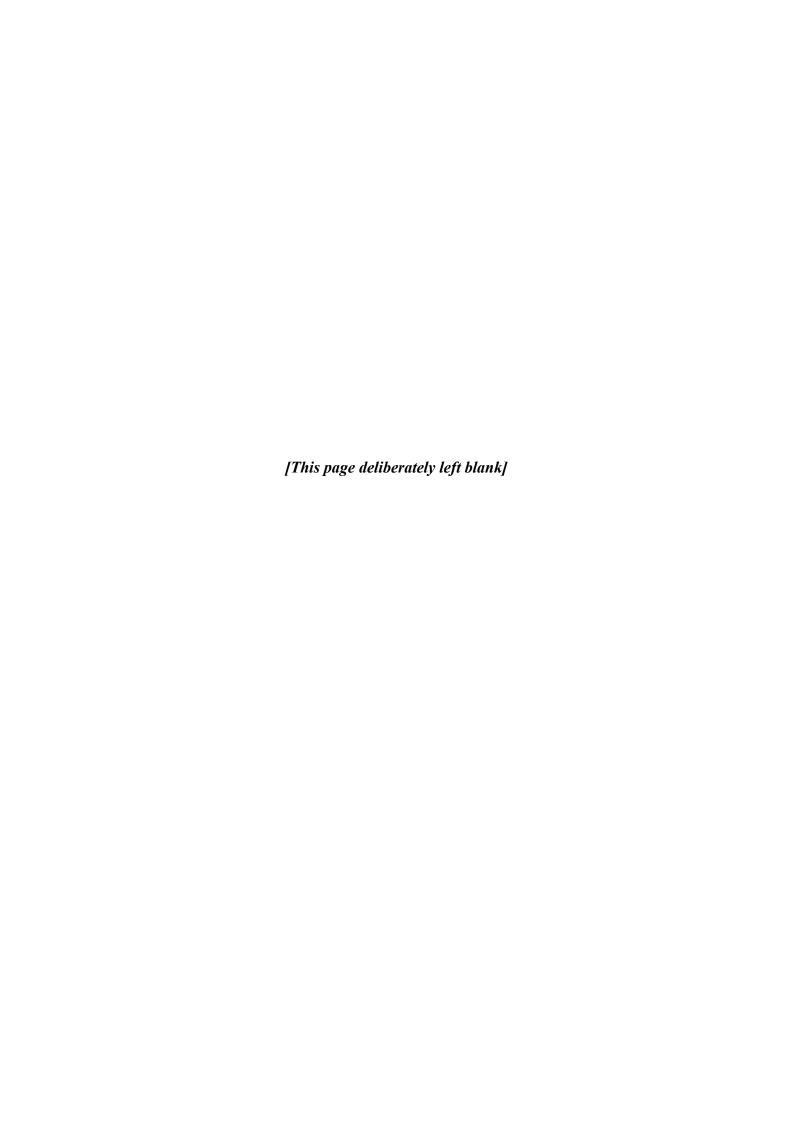
The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

'Statement on Reserves, approved by Council at its meeting on 26 April 2016

The Society holds no permanent endowment, and all its funds are expendable. Trustees regularly review the level of reserves required to meet the Charity's commitments to subscribers, for subscriptions received, and to editors, for volumes in various stages of preparation, and consider the consequences of a major reduction in income or increase in expenditure. Since the Society has generally issued publications in arrears to members paying subscriptions, it has been protected from the risk of amounting debts by allowing major expenditure only to follow accrual of income. The Trustees consider this policy to be sufficiently prudent in the circumstances.



The object of the Society is the advancement of religion and to educate the public in religious knowledge in particular by undertaking liturgical study and research and publishing the useful results thereof; in furtherance of these objects but no further or otherwise:

- (a) to print and publish facsimiles documents rare editions and manuscripts and such other works as may be deemed desirable;
- (b) to promote lectures and meetings;
- (c) to acquire receive and administer any copyrights and rights in the nature of copyrights relating to the foregoing objects.
