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1. Notice of Annual Meeting

The one hundred and twenty-first Annual Meeting of the Society will be held on Friday 26 April 2024 at 2 p.m. in the Redman Room, Trinity College, Cambridge CB2 1TQ. Following the Council meeting the **Henry Bradshaw Society Lecture 2024** will be held in the Winstanley Lecture Theatre, also in Trinity College, at **5 p.m.** We are delighted that

Margot Fassler, Keough-Hesburgh Professor Emerita of Music History and Liturgy, University of Notre Dame, will be joining us to speak on the subject of 'Hildegard von Bingen as Liturgist'.

Hildegard von Bingen is well known as a theologian, writer of letters, composer, poet, scientist, and probable designer of manuscript illuminations. But one of her most important roles was that of a liturgist, a person who was responsible for shaping the liturgical practices of a particular community and often providing liturgical materials for cantors and others to adapt for practice. This aspect of her work has not previously been studied in its many-faceted dimensions, which include the design of liturgical spaces, the creation of sermons, new hagiographical materials including saints' lives and *historiae*, a repertory of chants for the mass and office, a liturgical play set to music, and a liturgical commentary. Indeed, she worked in several of the kinds of liturgical materials that are published in the Henry Bradshaw Society volumes.

In this lecture, Hildegard's many liturgical endeavours will be shown to embody a particular hermeneutic of praise, one that is forcefully defined in her most famous letter, written to the prelates of Mainz near the end of her life. Her original approach to liturgy enabled her to create unique roles for the women it was her task to lead and inspire.

3. Minutes of the one hundred and twentieth Annual Meeting, Friday 9 June 2023

The one hundred and twentieth Annual Meeting of the Society was held on Friday 9 June 2023 at 2 p.m. in the Junior Parlour, Trinity College, Cambridge. Those present were Dr Nicolas Bell (General Secretary), Professor Sarah Hamilton, the Rev'd Dr Hugh Kennedy, the Rev'd Dr Uwe Michael Lang, Professor Rosalind Love, Professor Susan Rankin (Chairman of the Council), and Dr Alan Thacker. The following also joined the meeting online via Zoom: Dr Daniel DiCenso, Dr Eleanor Giraud, Professor John Harper, Dr Frank Lawrence, Mr Graham Mather, Dr Bernard Moreton (Treasurer), Dr David Pelteret, the Rev'd Dr Bruce Ritchie and Dr Elizabeth Teviotdale.

1. Professor Mayr-Harting was re-elected as President for the year 2023-24. He presented his apologies for not being present in person, and recorded his thanks for the work undertaken by the officers over the past year. Professor Rankin was asked to chair the meeting.

2. Apologies were received from Professor Katy Cubitt, Professor David Ganz, Dr Helen Gittos, Dr Anthony Harris, Professor Michael Lapidge (Vice-President), Kate Falardeau, Dr Henry Parkes, Fr Anthony Ward SM and the Rev'd Michael G. Witczak SLD.

3. Commemoration was made of Helmut Gneuss, for many years Vice-President of the Society, who had died on 26 February 2023 at the age of 95; of John Toy, a member of the Society for many years who served for several periods on its Council and who died on 17 October 2022 at the age of 91; and of Wayne D. Pokorny who died on 12 November 2021 at the age of 83.

4. The minutes of the one hundred and nineteenth meeting were received as an accurate record and signed by the Chairman of Council.

5. The Chairman reported that a copy of the Society's recent publication, David Pratt's edition of *English Coronation Ordines in the Ninth and Early Tenth Centuries*, had been presented to HM The King during the preparations for His Majesty's coronation service, and had been accepted with gratitude and added to the Royal Library.

6. The General Secretary and Treasurer presented their reports, and the Treasurer circulated Book Reports for 2022.

7. The Treasurer presented the Accounts, which had been examined by the Independent Examiner. The meeting accepted and formally approved the accounts. The Treasurer was thanked for his work in preparing them. It was agreed that the Secretary would write to Mr Patrick Clinton to thank him for his work in examining the accounts, and would file the accounts with the Charity Commission.

8. The meeting voted unanimously that the Officers of the Council for the year 2023–24 should be as follows:

9. The meeting considered the membership of the Council. Dr Jesse Billett's term of appointment ended at this meeting, and he was thanked for his work on the Society's behalf. Dr Daniel DiCenso, Dr Helen Gittos, Dr Frank Lawrence, Dr Henry Parkes were reappointed to serve for a further period of three years, until the Annual Meeting of 2026. A proposal had been received from Dr Moreton to elect Dr Anthony Harris to the Council, seconded by Prof. Rankin. This was unanimously agreed to, and Dr Harris was likewise appointed to serve for three years until the Annual Meeting of 2026.

10. The meeting considered the appointment of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for 2023. The Treasurer reported that Mr Patrick Clinton had offered to serve in this capacity once again, and the meeting agreed unanimously to accept his kind offer.

11. It was agreed that the one hundred and twenty-first Annual Meeting would be held on Friday 26 April, also in Cambridge.

12. The meeting ended at 2.30 p.m.

4. Secretary's Report for 2023

Following the publication of David Pratt's edition of English Coronation Ordines in the Ninth and Early Tenth Centuries a year ago, the Publications Committee has been active in advancing various further publications, though it is sadly now likely that none will appear in print until 2024. The Committee has also held meetings with our publishers Boydell & Brewer to discuss possible e-book editions of some of our Main Series volumes (the recent volumes in the Subsidia series are already available in electronic formats), as well as other aspects of future production.

The seminars on the history of liturgy sponsored by the Society at the Institute of Historical Research have continued successfully during the year, and draw a healthy mixture of participants, both in person and online.

In the course of the past year the Society welcomed eleven new members: Dr M. Carter (London), the Rev'd A. M. Daffern (Wells), Dr E. Z. D. Ellis (Hillsdale, MI), Mr I. Frisby (Durham), Prof. G. Muniz Alvarez (Orviedo), the Rev'd Dr R. Pickles (Langholm), Mrs R. J. Riddel (Savannah, GA), Mrs P. Rivett (Virginia Water), Dr J. M. Starke (Arlington VA), Mr C. Walsh (Metuchen, NJ), and Ms R. Warren (Cambridge).

5. Treasurer's Report for 2023

The Independently Examined Accounts are set out below in the usual format. A statement of income and expenditure by volume will be available as usual at the Annual Meeting, together with the accounts to date for 2024.

The changes in investment valuation in 2023, now recovered from the depression of 2022, together with bank interest payments in the year, are reflected in proportionate adjustments to the Burr Fund, in addition to the previous practice of allocating a proportion of bank interest payments.

The Society has £24k in a 1-year deposit with the Charity Bank at 3.56%, maturing on 15 July 2024. The interest will be credited to the balance on the maturity date, with the balance as of 31/12/2023 remaining the same as on the day of deposit. So that this interest due appears in the 2023 Accounts, I have posted a rounded sum of £390.00 to Bank Accruals, with a contra to Accruals Control. The full posting of that interest will be made on maturity in July 2024.

The finances of the Society remain healthy, and well-prepared to fund the volumes in preparation.

The examination also gave consideration as to unusual items or disclosures in the accounts.

Statement on Reserves, approved by Council at its meeting on 26 April 2016

The Society holds no permanent endowment, and all its funds are expendable. Trustees regularly review the level of reserves required to meet the Charity's commitments to subscribers, for subscriptions received, and to editors, for volumes in various stages of preparation, and consider the consequences of a major reduction in income or increase in expenditure. Since the Society has generally issued publications in arrears to members paying subscriptions, it has been protected from the risk of amounting debts by allowing major expenditure only to follow accrual of income. The Trustees consider this policy to be sufficiently prudent in the circumstances.

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The object of the Society is the advancement of religion and to educate the public in religious knowledge in particular by undertaking liturgical study and research and publishing the useful results thereof; in furtherance of these objects but no further or otherwise:

(a) to print and publish facsimiles documents rare editions and manuscripts and such other works as may be deemed desirable;

(b) to promote lectures and meetings;

(c) to acquire receive and administer any copyrights and rights in the nature of copyrights relating to the foregoing objects.

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
